About Jose Alvarez

Professor Alvarez is the Herbert and Rose Rubin Professor of International Law at New York University School of Law. His previous academic positions include the Hamilton Fish Professor of International Law and Diplomacy and the executive director of the Center on Global Legal Problems at Columbia Law School, professor of law at the University of Michigan Law School, associate professor at the George Washington University’s National Law Center, and adjunct professor at Georgetown Law Center. At NYU he teaches courses on international law, foreign investment, and international organizations. He has served as President of the American Society of International Law (ASIL) and is co-editor in chief, of the American Journal of International Law.

Prior to entering academia in 1989, he was an attorney adviser with the Office of the Legal Adviser of the U.S. Department of State and was the legal adviser to the administration of justice program in Latin America coordinated by the Agency of International Development. Educated at Harvard College, Harvard Law School, and Oxford University, Professor Alvarez has also been in private practice and was a judicial clerk to the late Hon. Thomas Gibbs Gee of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals.

Professor Alvarez’s activities include memberships in the Council on Foreign Relations, the U.S. Department of State’s Advisory Committee on Public International Law, and service on the board of the Center for Reproductive Rights, as special adviser on public international law to the International Criminal Court’s first prosecutor, Luis Moreno Ocampo, and as an expert witness in a number of investor-state arbitrations.
